ASL Interpreter Residency

A new ASL Interpreter Residency is underway. The goal of this program is to enhance the healthcare interpreting skills of licensed interpreters in eastern NC. Residents will work in a variety of disciplines including primary care, rehabilitation, cardiology, endocrinology, women's care, emergency medicine, and more. The resident starts in outpatient clinics and rehabilitation facilities and transitions to inpatient and emergency care over the course of two years. Opportunities to work alongside Deaf interpreters, as well as other spoken language interpreters, are available during the residency.

The ASL interpreter residency program will accept **one** new resident each year. This is a two-year, full time commitment, and residents must maintain a current NCITLB license during their tenure. Travel throughout the ECU Health healthcare system is required.
